The Queen's Platinum Jubilee Celebrations

Our May edition article in FCN will give detailed guidance and a summary of what will be arranged for you to participate in on Saturday 4th June, on the common opposite Frenchay Parish Church from lunchtime onwards. All parties involved are currently putting their plans together, this will include live music and entertainment as we enjoy picnics on the common together. Such planning, we are reliably informed, includes dry and warm weather!

Becks Pool Update.

It was great to see the pond team getting back into action in March, including some youngsters as part of their DofE commitments. Progress is being made on the power supply for a new aeration system and stone plinth information station, so watch this space for further exciting news.

Lots of the marginal and bank planting schemes done several years ago are becoming nicely established and providing an ever improving 'wild' habitat for many species now.

This has become a tranquil haven for many who visit it and observe nature at its best.

Biodiversity Projects

We mentioned in March's article, that our local Councillor Liz Brennan, was facilitating a 'matched funding' application for FRA to cover half the costs for a considerable amount of our biodiversity work. This includes all of the bulbs and wild flower seed mixes, plus important scarifying equipment, as we embark upon biodiversity projects for 2022.

FRA will receive £1,560 from this support, so many thanks to Liz for her support of FRA.

Another key project has been the very kind donation by NHS/NHBT of 23 fruit trees to help establish a new 'Community Orchard' along the new pathway route to school, from the hole in the wall on Beckspool Road to the nature reserve. In late February a team of FRA and DofE volunteers planted the trees in almost monsoon conditions, very timely and perfect for mulching the next day. We still have guards to put around the trees, which are on order by NHS, but this is coming together nicely now and hopefully will be part of the Parish parklands very soon. FRA and some of the nearby allotment holders will be acting as guardians for maintaining and nurturing these trees. Once the new school is complete the whole community orchard will support educational needs and projects, followed hopefully by some delicious edible produce to share in years to come.

It is also good to see that the Voluntary Village Green links past Frenchay Park House and the grass avenue by the old observation ward bungalows down to the nature reserve and allotments are now nearing completion. This is part of the eventual handover to the Parish, which is making slow but steady progress as all of the making good of that area is finalised. It is nearly ten years now since this land was saved as a Voluntary Village Green as part of the previous RUG campaign. To have that all completed will signal a great achievement, giving us chance to recognise those who worked so hard in Frenchay's Best Interests.

Getting Current Promises Fulfilled

In our 2022 FCN articles to date we have highlighted the local issues that we continually fight for in Frenchay asking you, as residents, to make representation to our District Councillors on these issues to add weight to our campaigns.

One very important matter in this respect has been the application to extend and modernise Frenchay Museum, which is featured separately in Hugh Whatley's article in this month's magazine.

FRA and Frenchay Museum Committee are very grateful for the outstanding public support following FRA's urgent e-mail appeal two days before the SGC planning management committee meeting.

Councillor Ben Burton had 38 e-mail messages from residents to reinforce his support for the extension, in addition to those who put supportive responses on the SGC planning portal. So the museum can now move forward and 'modernise' their facilities, immense gratitude is due to Hugh Whatley and the Museum Committee for persisting with the planning 'crystal maze' and to SGC Councillor Ben Burton who supported this all the way.

So, removal and suitable replacements for the Frenchay Common traffic 'build outs', adequate Nursery School provision for the new primary school opening September this year and health plus social care facilities next to BIRU are among the promises still left to fulfil.

If any of you receive Downend Voice, please refer to the very good letter published from Barbara Harris on page 42 of the March issue about the promised community hospital facilities, which first were pledged back in 2005. Let us hope that SGC can have a proper plan for us to consider very soon. Like many things in Frenchay that involve infrastructure and facilities (for a village that will have doubled in size over the last four years), it seems that these needs are being ignored or never considered a priority.

Thank you for your engagement and continuing support.

Councillor Ben Burton reports:

Frenchay Village Museum

I was really pleased to see that the Planning Committee overturned the planning officer's recommendation and gave approval for the extension to Frenchay Museum. Local residents understand the importance of Frenchay Museum and the tireless dedication of the volunteers who run it. I am very grateful to all those residents who either spoke in support or sent me messages in advance of the committee meeting. I was able to highlight this level of support in my submissions to the committee and I am sure it played a part in convincing other Councillors to approve the plans

In my view, granting the planning application was the right decision because the best way of conserving buildings is to ensure they have relevance today and a future use. There is no point in 'conservation for conservation sake' that would then lead to a building deteriorating, especially when it is in such a prominent location. I was really pleased that the planning committee listened to local views and the strong support for the proposed extension. I am hopeful that this will just be the start in providing improvements to the public realm around Frenchay and to ensuring that essential facilities are provided locally.

We will now look positively to the future and assist the Frenchay Museum committee in turning these plans into reality.

Downend Library

We know that many residents regularly make the short journey to Downend Library to use the various facilities. One of the common complaints was the lack of a toilet that was open to the public and this often caused issues for parents with young children when using the library.

I am pleased to report that funding was secured for a new toilet to be installed and work is currently taking place. Downend Library will reopen on Saturday 19 March 2022. We hope the additional facilities will help support the vital service that the library provides, especially considering the extra investment that was recently allocated as part of the Council's budget to improve child literacy

As we reported last year, Downend Library also operates a housebound library service that is open to residents in Frenchay. Volunteers or staff will deliver books or other materials to residents on a monthly basis. 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FRENCHAY VILLAGE MUSEUM

- Planning permission for a new extension!

It was 'third time lucky' in our attempts to persuade the planners of the need for an extension to West Lodge and perhaps a good omen that the formal permission was issued in time for the AGM of Frenchay Tuckett Society (FTS) last month.

This milestone has been achieved with the help and support of Councillor Ben Burton who joined us for a presentation to South Glos Planning Committee, who made the actual decision on 3rd March.

The journey started in the autumn of 2017, shortly after concluding a new 125 year lease, with a feasibility study which looked at all aspects of the Museum's future. At that time, it was hoped to have something ready for the 20th anniversary of the original opening in April 2000, so the new target is 2025! (Perhaps with celebrations extending onto the 'new' Village Green.)

Our design proposals tick all the architectural & conservation boxes and will provide additional multi-use display & meeting space, proper storage, an inside toilet and a dedicated office / work room. The plans also include an outside activity area, a fenced garden alongside the new road from the mini-roundabout and general improvements to the setting of the old Lodge.


We have already taken advice from heritage mentors about the implementation of our plans – both financially and in terms of supporting current volunteers and the existing week-to-week operations.

As I write, Mr. Putin's forces are on their 13th day of invasion in Ukraine. The signs are that a very courageous resistance has been made so far. Ever since waking up to hear the news on 24th February, I have sensed the world become a darker place. As though a shadow has been cast over that part of the world, that is translating into innumerable shadows over the lives of all who care.



There are practical things we can do. Locally in Frenchay and Stapleton there is a Refugee Support Network, that is making ready for that possibility that one day we will have the opportunity and privilege of hosting Ukrainian refugees in this part of Bristol.

The light of dawn is associated with the arrival of Mary Magdalene at the empty tomb with her friends, early on Easter morning.

The post-pandemic period here in Bristol harbours much new discovery, opportunities for good change, but also the likelihood of economic distress for many. 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Up and Running Again: the 'Frenchay 10 K' returns!

The 40th Frenchay 10K is set to be held on **Sunday the 24th April 2002**, starting and finishing at the UWE Glenside Campus, but with the central part of the course making its way through Frenchay, and attracting a large number of both runners and spectators, while raising substantial funds for charity.

Back in 1979, local resident John Honeywell attended a talk given by Hugh Coakham, pioneering neurosurgeon working at Frenchay Hospital, about brain tumour surgery in 1979, which inspired John and his friend John Laurie to raise some money to fund his research. They were both on the local neighbourhood council at that time. As John was also a runner at the time, he thought, why not set up a race, and the Frenchay 10k (F10k) was born!

After raising money for Hugh's research for 7 years, F10k began selecting different charities, as Hugh's research became funded nationally by Imperial Cancer Research. The first Frenchay10k meeting took place on North Street Downend, next door to where the legendary cricketer WG Grace used to live. This year will be John Honeywell's last as race director, and in recognition of his fantastic efforts with the 10k, in 2021 he was given a 'Champions's Award' by the Parish Council

Originally the prize for every runner was a certificate signed by Hugh Coakham. Then it was medals, until the famous mugs were added - we think sometime in the mid 90's. These mugs are much sought after!

The inaugural F10k had about 120 runners, which has risen greatly over the years to around 600 runners each year, and in 2022, they are hoping for a record field of 700 runners to celebrate the 40th running of the race. Since the inauguration of the race, it has been held each year with the exceptions of 2001 (due to Foot and Mouth), 2020, and 2021 (both years due to Covid), meaning that the 2022 race will be the 40th occasion and which makes it one of the oldest such regular events of this type in the country.

Nick Rose, Olympian and former international runner, is the current course record holder from sometime in the 80s. Nick was the half marathon world record holder for a few months in 1979, and he was the British champion for the 10k, 2 mile and 4 x 1 mile relay. When he ran the F10k he famously ran to the event, ran the race and won it, and then ran back home afterwards!

The same solicitors from Fishponds have always sponsored the race - currently Star Legal, previously under the name of Davis Wood solicitors, and before that again, as Bennett & Legat.

This year's nominated charities are the Freewheelers (Bloodbikes) and Ronald McDonald House Bristol. Both charities provide marshal support volunteers, and all the proceeds from the race (less the expenses) are donated each year to the charities. Since the race was instigated in 1979, it is estimated that nearly £175,000 has been raised for local charities.



Where to watch in Frenchay.

At around the 6k mark, the route crosses Frenchay Bridge, turning right to go up Frenchay Hill, then left into Church Road, passing the school, making its way alongside the Common on to Begbrook Park, where it turns left on to Frenchay Park Road, all the way down to Duchess Gate, and then bears left towards Blackberry Hill and leading eventually to the Finish at the UWE Glenside Campus.. A map of the route can be found on the Frenchay10k website.

So, be there to support the event, to encourage the runners, or better still to be one of them, but either way, to enjoy the day and to help raise money for the Charities.

Entries are welcomed on-line, at frenchay10k.co.uk, and at the time of writing, there is already a field of over 350 runners. You can follow on twitter and facebook. There is always a field of established runners, casual runners and people who just enjoy a leisurely jog or stroll around the course. Although entries are usually accepted on the day, with a record field in mind, it may be too late so book your place now to guarantee entry! The race starts at 11.00 am on Sunday 24 April, from UWE campus, Blackberry Hill,

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Women of Frenchay Exhibition: Frenchay Village Museum

In this new exhibition we examine the role of women in the workplace, how class distinctions defined the opportunities that were available to them and how social change and key moments in history blurred these lines. These themes will be explored through the lives of women who lived in Frenchay in the 19th and 20th centuries and will features a variety of objects from our collection that can help narrate this story.

Frenchay has been home to numerous business owning families, which gave gainful employment to many women in the local South Gloucestershire area. One such business was Fry's chocolate; in this exhibition we will explore the role of women within this organisation. Furthermore, we highlight the importance of education for women and the jobs that emerged for them as a result, for example nursing and teaching as shown through VAD nurses based at Cleve Hill Hospital and the women who taught at Frenchay Village School.



Another dimension to this exhibition will be how middle and upper class women filled their days, changing attitudes to work among the upper echelons of society and what triggered this. As well as this there will be examples of what work women of this status could do and how defining moments in History, like the First World War, transformed society's expectation of the female sex

This exhibition will be open from the 20th March in our Temporary Exhibition space and will include an accompanying exhibition guide and activities for children and families to enjoy.

Recipe for the Month

This is a quick and easily prepared meal for 2 cooked in less than an hour. For 4 double everything but only use an extra 250ml of liquid.

Pot Chickpea Sweet Potato Spinach Curry (Vegan/gluten free)

1 tsp oil ½ to ¾ tsp cumin seeds

½ red onion chopped 3 cloves of garlic chopped

½ inch ginger chopped 1 tsp coriander powder

½ tsp garam masala or use curry powder or other spice blend of choice

like berbere or cajun

½ tsp turmeric ¼ tsp cinnamon

1/4 tsp black pepper 1/4 to 1/2 tsp cayenne/red chilli powder

2 tomatoes chopped

400gm can chickpeas drained or other beans

150gm chopped peeled sweet potato or pumpkin or other squash

500ml water (substitute 240ml of coconut milk for creamier curry)

½ tsp salt 50gm chopped or baby spinach 1 tsp lemon juice

Heat the oil in a deep sided frying pan or skillet (with a lid).

Add cumin seeds and cook until they change colour and get fragrant. Let them cook until really toasty.

Add onions, garlic and ginger and cook until translucent.

Add the spices and mix in. Cook for 30 seconds.

Add tomatoes and a splash of water, mix, cover and cook until tomatoes get saucy. Mash the larger pieces. 4 to 5 minutes.

Add chickpeas, sweet potatoes, water and salt. Mix, cover and cook for 15 minutes.

Add in the spinach, lemon juice, mix in, reduce heat to low-medium and continue to simmer for 5 to 10 minutes or until desired consistency.

Taste and adjust salt and spice. Garnish with paprika and cilantro and serve as is, with rice/quinoa or garlic flatbread.

Variations: Add 240ml of coconut milk for a creamier curry at step 4 instead of all water.

April Gardening

In April the weather can still remain unpredictable and we can have anything from a heatwave to ground frosts and sleet; be prepared. Now is the time to really start off new plants and seedlings, watch trees and shrubs bursting back into life.

Sowing from seed can be time-consuming and tricky but also very rewarding. If this sounds a bit daunting - the web and garden centres have a great choice of plug plants for bedding and vegetables. These small plants benefit from a frost free environment and as much all round light as you can give them; greenhouse, conservatory, window sill or porch.

Take care with watering, too much at the early stages and the small plants could rot. It is best to increase watering slowly as the plant grows. When the plug plants arrive, they are often in small thumb sized pots and really need to be potting on immediately. Take care to pot them up just one size as it will do better. Tip – some garden centres have a box outside with unwanted pots – have a look.

If you are going to plant the plugs in containers or hanging baskets, it's a good idea to plant them in the container and grow on in the greenhouse until ready to plant out. This will help the plants establish a good root system in the container before placing outside. When growing bedding plants nip out the growing points to produce a bushier plant, otherwise some plants, particularly petunia, fuchsia, verbena will grow leggy later in the season. The rule of thumb is do not plant out bedding plants until the risk of frost has passed; this is likely to be towards the end of May. You can plant out earlier, but monitor the weather and if frost is forecast, you will need to protect with a cloche or fleece.

Lawn care If you haven't managed an initial cut yet try and get on to it sooner rather than later as April can be a warmer wet month which will speed growth but makes mowing difficult. Keep the mowing height on the high side until May unless you're raking or scarifying and then you'll need a fairly low cut.

Mow in the afternoon to allow the grass daytime drying time.

Keep the cut on the high side until you get to a more frequent mowing pattern.

Be careful with the turns as the ground can be soft.

Thoroughly clean the mower - wet grass sticks under the mower.

Make sure your mower blade is sharp.

Patches in lawns can appear for a number of reasons, and when they do, it is always advisable to repair them. Re-seeding, or turfing bare patches will prevent weeds germinating in the patches and of course it looks much better. This is the month to get your spring lawn feed into the lawn. The demands of the winter will have taken their toll and a spring feed is critical for a healthy lawn.

'Water-lilies'



As April is my birthday month, I am being self-indulgent

and writing about two of my favourite subjects—the artist Claude Monet and waterlilies. Monet was born in Paris in 1840, but his famous work was achieved in Giverny. This is where the River Seine meets the River Epte, and is just 75 kilometres north of Paris.

Monet and his family bought a large house there in 1872. Eighteen years later he bought a strip of marshland across the road and diverted a stream to form a pond. Soon clusters of lilies floated in it and a Japanese bridge crossed it. Many years later my husband and I visited it at least once a year.

Water-lilies in French are called Nénuphars. . Monet's paintings of them are the most famous of all his work.. He painted them not only in shades of pink but also in tones of red.. I always paint hem in white, with very pale pink centres. I was offered an art exhibition in a gallery in St. Tropez when we lived there. Very sadly my husband had serious cancer at the time, so of course I had no time to paint the number of canvasses needed!

I wonder how many of you reading this paint? If you haven't tried it, why not give it a go? Whatever subject you choose, you need plenty of white in order to create different shades. Perhaps you will find it a new fascinating hobby: I hope so. **Esmé**

P.S. Start by painting the canvas all over. For instance, do this a third of the way down in <u>very</u> pale blue, and two thirds up in several <u>very</u> light greens. When dry, start painting. Good luck!
