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A NEW FRIENDS' GROUP FOR FRENCHAY PARKLANDS?

Some two years ago, at the November 2019 AGM of Frenchay Preservation Society (FPS), it was proposed that FPS should sponsor the formation of a Friends' Group to *support* the long-term management of the 20+ acres of hospital land being handed over as a Voluntary Village Green (VVG).

There was unanimous agreement at the AGM to this course of action after presentations from a South Glos Officer and representatives of Page Park in Staple Hill, where just such a Friends' Group was able to bid for additional funding not available to local councils. At this point I must stress that this is a complementary activity to the planned management of the VVG as one of the 'Parish Council Assets' and is not in any way a criticism of the available budgets! In fact, these additional funds will help to ensure that we can optimize our response to the generally acknowledged 'climate emergency' in the way that we are able to look after a major addition to our natural environment as 'Frenchay Parklands'.

So, fast-forward two years and where are we? Unfortunately, the answer is still struggling to come to terms with delays caused by the covid pandemic and various legal issues which have prevented the handover of the VVG. However, I am feeling reasonably confident of better news in 2022, which is why I am now setting out a summary of what needs to be done – in three clear stages:

The good news is that the unanimous backing at the AGM of Frenchay Preservation Society means that we have already achieved Stage 1 – the identification of a 'sponsor organisation'.

Stage 2 is to arrange a public meeting, with some display boards and relevant information which will encourage local residents to show support by simply adding their names to a list. If we manage to persuade at least half of 'Frenchay' to drop in and show support then we can move on to Stage 3...

Stage 3 is to actually set-up the Friends' Group - *if the support is there!* Offers of help are already available with such matters as constitution (vital when bidding for public money) and setting initial aims & objectives. In an ideal world, and subject to stage 2, we will be able to recruit a representative range of volunteers who feel able to make all this happen! (Whilst promoting Frenchays Best Interests at the same time.)

Meanwhile, back to Stage 2. I am looking for 'short-term volunteers' who would like to join a small group and help to organise a public meeting in the spring of 2022. The tasks are fairly straightforward: prepare some information boards (eg; what friends groups do, the 20 acres of land, examples of what others have achieved). We also need to set-up on the day, 'meet & greet' and make a record of those attending, with any comments. If you would like to help, my contact details are shown below.

Frenchay's Hollywood Star at the Arnolfini

On **January 7th** at the Arnolfini in Bristol there is a screening of the 1921 silent film, "The Three Musketeers", starring Douglas Fairbanks as d'Artagnan, and Frenchay's very own Nigel de Brulier as Cardinal Richelieu, The picture below shows Fairbanks as D'Artagnan, and De Brulier as Richelieu.

Nigel de Brulier was born Francis Packer in the South Lodge of Frenchay Park in 1877. He went to Frenchay School, then by the age of thirteen he was working in Frenchay Park House as a hall boy. He emigrated to America sometime before 1900, where he became an actor and took the stage name Nigel de Brulier. He appeared in his first Hollywood film in 1914, and he featured in more than 120 films before his death in 1948.

Our Minister writes:

Dear All,

Arise, shine! For your light has come,
And the glory of the Lord has risen upon you.
Look! Darkness shall cover the earth,
And thick darkness cover the peoples;
But the Lord will arise upon you,
And His glory shall be seen upon you!



I don't know whether every shepherd in Bethlehem in the days of Emperor Caesar Augustus knew these words from the prophet Isaiah. If they did, whether they had any inkling that they might be fulfilled in their own time. And if so, how many actually expected to be festooned with angels praising God on the hillside, declaring: 'Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace...'

What about us? When we gather on the Common on 20th December, or in the Parish Church the night before, will we know that God's true light of hope is shining on us? The last 2 years or so have been a time of trial. This was the context into which Isaiah spoke 700 years before Christ. Israel was in isolation and exile. Are we feeling in a bit of a fog, while the pandemic panders on?

As the old carol, 'God rest ye merry' gives in refrain:

O tidings of comfort and joy!

The light of hope is right in front of our eyes. Have we noticed? To you and me, the Son of God has come, born of a virgin, wrapped in warm dry cloths, but lying in a manger. Soon to be a refugee, having escaped a scene of terrible genocide, to live 30 years of relative obscurity in a town of little repute: Nazareth in Galilee. And yet, he was and is the One.

The angels put on a great show at his curtain call on the Bethlehem hillside. The shepherds went and looked into the matter. We have the events of Jesus' life, death and resurrection faithfully recorded in the bible. Yet have we, personally, realised our hope? Has he 'entered in' to our lives?

O Little town of Bethlehem: the Story behind the Carol

Neither the writer nor the composer of this well-known Christmas carol had any thought that it would live beyond one Sunday-school service.

The writer, Phillips Brooks, was born in 1835 in Boston, Massachusetts, and was given his mother's surname as his forename. He graduated from Harvard University in 1855 and started work as a schoolteacher, but was sacked. Regarding himself as a miserable failure, he switched careers and underwent ordination training qualifying in 1859 from Virginia Theological Seminary. After being ordained as a priest in 1860, he was appointed Rector to Episcopal churches in Philadelphia. At 6ft 4 ins tall, he became well-known for his height as well as his preaching. During the American Civil War he supported the North and opposed slavery. In 1869 he became Rector of Trinity Church, Boston, where there is a statue of him outside the church. His output of publications was prodigious, including volumes of sermons. Various honorary degrees were conferred on him, including Doctor of Divinity from Oxford University in England. Two schools were founded in his name. In 1891, he was consecrated Bishop of Massachusetts, but sadly died only two years later at the age of 57. He was buried with great ceremony at Mount Auburn Cemetery in Cambridge, Massachusetts.

In 1868, Phillips Brooks wrote the text of this carol for the Christmas Sunday-school service at his church, having been inspired by a visit, one Christmas, to Bethlehem. The organist of the church, Lewis Redner, composed a tune for it called "St Louis". This has become the standard tune for the carol in America, but not in the UK. The tune we use here is called "Forest Green" and was adapted by Ralph Vaughan Williams from an English folk ballad "The ploughboy's dream" given to him by a labourer, Henry Garman, of Forest Green in Surrey. The hymn was published in *The English Hymnal* in 1906.

This is the last of my hymn articles, my first one being in September 2010. I do hope you have enjoyed reading the fascinating and sometimes poignant stories behind the hymns, as much as I have in researching and writing them.

Judith also explained further:

"I have decided to call it a day partly owing to the increasing difficulty of finding hymns with an author or composer about whom I have not already written, and partly owing to my need to cut back on my commitments. Playing the organ almost every week and playing for choir rehearsals takes up a lot of my time, along with all the practice that is required.

I've thoroughly enjoyed doing the research for these. It has been fascinating uncovering all sorts of facts, such as the origin of the word Neanderthal, as well as the very human stories and amazing coincidences that led to the writing of a hymn."

Making the most of your Garden in December

December weather is often the worst of the year in that it is grey, wet, cold and dank. However, if we get cold, frosty weather then the garden can be transformed into a glittering wonderland and suddenly all kinds of winter jobs are possible from winter pruning, gathering up those papery leaves and tidying up those messy borders. If you haven't yet cleared out your used compost it can be used to level up lawns or spread over the borders as an extra mulch.



Each year we use what we can find in the garden to make our Christmas wreath. It may not look professional but there is something about using whatever we find to create a thing personal to us.

Yes, the holly can be very painful to use, Japonica sometimes "loose" their berries before we get there but the birds are welcome to them and making a wreath to hang on your front door is a lovely welcoming gesture at Christmas.

Why not have a go yourself? It's really easy!

Begin by wrapping a combination of holly, ivy, pine sprigs and mistletoe around a flexible wire frame then shape this around an overturned bowl. That will ensure your wreath has a nice, even circular shape. Arrange berries, twigs, foraged pinecones and teasels amongst the leaves before securing them together with small ties of string. Adding rosemary gives a lovely scent each time you open the door. If you fancy it, add a touch of sparkle or some snowflake shaped decorations amongst the leaves. Use red or gold ribbon to hang it up, this can even be hung inside the house on the back of any door. Too much? How about a Christmas posy of your favourite plants tied with a red, gold or silver ribbon?

FRA this year is also inviting Frenchay Residents (and beyond) to have a festive window display – further invitations in this copy. This is an opportunity to bring our outdoors in! Garden foliage and other odds and ends found in the treasure trove that is the back garden, can make stunning festive displays, centre pieces and even the main event – the Christmas tree itself! We have a Christmas tree in a pot that we move to our front of house display.

You never know what you might unearth if you go for a forage in the foliage or root around in the rough. Logs, twigs, stones, pebbles, leaves and branches can make super versatile Christmas objects. Try making a window box with silver foliage plants and bright red cyclamen - it will look fabulous!

Relax in the knowledge that as well as creating stunning, one-of-a-kind festive masterpieces, you're also doing your bit for the planet and bring your own potpourri of natural fragrance to your home.

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December Recipe

This is a great dessert for a Christmas party with family and friends and an alternative to Christmas pudding. The Pavlova can be made up to a month ahead and after wrapping it in cling film and foil can be stored in a cool place.

Christmas Pavlova

This will serve 12 -15

For the Pavlova -

6 large egg whites

350g caster sugar

1 tsp white wine vinegar

1 tsp cornflour

Decoration

Mint leaves and icing sugar for dusting



2. Line a large baking tray with baking parchment and draw a 30cm circle in the middle of the paper. Draw a 15cm circle in the centre of the larger circle to make a ring.

- 3. With an electric whisk, whisk the egg whites to soft peaks when the whisk is removed. Whisking on maximum speed gradually add the sugar a teaspoon a time until they are soft and glossy. Mix the vinegar and cornflour in a cup and stir into the egg whites in the meringue.
- 4. Spoon the meringue onto the ring drawn on the baking parchment. With a large spoon make a shallow trench in the meringue for the fruit and cream to sit in.
- 5. Transfer to the oven and immediately reduce the temperature to 140C/120C/Gas 1. Bake for an hour to an hour and a quarter until the outside is hard but still white. Turn off the oven and leave the Pavlova inside for an hour or overnight to cool and dry.
- 6. To assemble, whip the cream, vanilla paste and icing sugar until stiff peaks form when the whisk is removed. Spoon the cream into the trench in the meringue. Arrange the fruit on top and decorate with a few mint leaves and sift over icing sugar before serving.



For the filling -

600ml double cream

1 tsp vanilla bean paste

50g icing sugar, sifted

200g strawberries, hulled and quartered

300g raspberries

200g blueberries
