Don't be shy, come and join in with all of the fun that we have working together in Frenchay's best interests.

We are very grateful to Frenchay Parish Church as our partner, the vicar Charles Sugden assures me that their intervention gave us the good weather, to fulfil that rash promise we repeatedly made in previous FCN articles. Fortune favours the brave? We are also pleased that for the Reverend Judith Lee we finally fulfilled her dream to have a 'songs of praise' on Frenchay Common. That sets us up nicely now for the Flower Show on 9th July.

So many thanks to the FRA team on the ground, Concord Wind Band, the Church Choir with Frenchay Foxes and The Provision youth jazz band. (*seen here*) Hopefully something for all.

We are also very grateful for your generosity with our bucket collection for the musicians, which raised a total of £300.50. So we will donate £100 each to Concord wind band and The Provision jazz band towards their expenses and young person's' development work.



£50 will go the Church Choir and Frenchay Foxes for their community work. The balance will be retained towards the event expenses, like the two portaloos, which were £148 total.

Village Wild Flower Projects

You will hopefully have enjoyed the lovely wild flower drifts by Becks Pool recently, the thorough preparative work done there last year has meant that this summer we have a truly natural display that includes some rare orchids. The same applies to the other sites around the village where marker signs show you what is set aside, which we will continue to develop and enhance.

As an experiment we have been able to leave the Tuckett common haha's to see what comes through and to provide much needed habitat/protection for wildlife. These are now being lightly trimmed every six weeks and a project will start soon to remove excess invasive plant growth, which will be used as training for our DofE student team.

As a long term project there is still much work to do and in a future article we will do a feature on just what is involved to prepare and maintain our wild areas.

I think it will surprise you all just what it entails, but the results are well worth the effort!

Tuckett Field Proposals

In June's copy we highlighted a proposal that has been received for regenerating the wild flower meadow, similar to that planned by the National Trust in the adjacent field.

The initiative being put before Winterbourne Parish Council (WPC) aims to replant the field with local wildflowers, add some replacement native trees and improve the area around theTuckett pond. The plan also aims to implement a conservation grazing regime.

Thank you to everyone who responded to the survey that FRA circulated which was most helpful in gauging public opinion on this opportunity to enhance, and improve, that well used space.

Please note that this is not at all connected to the search for a suitable location for some new allotment space, this is being considered by WPC as there are long waiting lists for current allotment space and more is required.

We understand that some funds from development S106 monies is available to Frenchay for such provision. Once the new voluntary village green space has been transferred officially to the Parish all possible locations can be considered and consulted upon with residents. This is something that WPC will ask FRA to assist with organising with a public meeting later in the year.

Observation Corner

Each month we will pose a question where the answer might surprise you, or at least make you stop and think.

Q The new primary school is due to be finished and start to be occupied this September, part of that plan included additional nursery school provision, where the old Observation Ward buildings were a possible solution, before they were sold by SGC for private development.

FRA provided a detailed feasibility report in June 2020 upon how this provision could be made and to propose how the old school buildings could be used.

So in light of all of this effort by FRA have we had any progress or news of a viable solution to resolve this vital need to support our residents with pre-school children?

A At this stage we know that the sale proceeds for the old Observation Ward have now been set aside for nursery school provision, but no definitive plan has been announced.

It could be that our thoughts were not welcomed and a better plan will become clear to us all very soon? We sincerely hope so!

I look forward to seeing you at the Frenchay Flower Show on Saturday 9th July, thank you all for your engagement and continuing support.

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Councillor Ben Burton reports :

Jubilee Celebrations

We were really pleased to see so many residents taking the opportunity to enjoy the various events that were organised to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. Personally, I had two very different experiences; sitting in the sunshine late into the evening on the Thursday followed by a more 'traditional' cold and blustery street party on the Sunday afternoon. The real positive was to see such great community spirit and children playing out in the streets.

We were really pleased to see that South Gloucestershire Council helped to support both formally organised events with funding whilst at the same time making it free and easy to close roads for street parties. We must also express our gratitude to the local emergency services who were able to visit several street parties to allow children the opportunity to see inside ambulances, fire engines and Police vans (including several opportunities to play with the sirens!). We hope that there will be similar opportunities for future national and local celebrations in the future, especially with an extended bank holiday weekend.

Reporting Issues

We continue to receive reports of issues in the local area, including isolated incidents of graffiti and untidy or overgrowing verges. The weather at this time of year often sees road side verges grow rapidly and this can narrow footways. Please continue to report these issues to the Streetcare team so they are aware and can respond quickly, especially where there might be safety issues. The best way of reporting is using the online forms on the South Gloucestershire Council website. However, we will also be happy to make reports on your behalf.

The Streetcare team will act quickly when graffiti on Council owned infrastructure or buildings is reported. However, when this graffiti is on private land then then it becomes more complicated. If you are unsure about ownership then please report it to the Council or ourselves and we will do are best to try and find the appropriate solution. As we all know, if graffiti is removed quickly then it reduces the chances of it reoccurring.

Litter Pick

We have arranged several litter picks recently in Downend and Bromley Heath. These have been targeted at 'problem' locations and we have been able to leave the area looking much tidier. We would very much like to arrange the next litter pick in Frenchay. Residents locally are doing a fantastic job at keeping the village clean and tidy but if you know of any isolated problems locations then please let us know. We will then advertise the litter pick in due course and bring the necessary equipment and bags



Our meeting in May was our Resolutions evening when a member gave us an outline of what was being proposed -Women and Girls with ASD & ADHD - under-identified, under-diagnosed, misdiagnosed, under-supported. The resolution was unanimously passed and will go to the National Federation of Women's Institutes Annual Meeting and, if adopted, will go on to form the basis of a WI campaign



Gardening in July

July is a month to reflect on your hard work and to enjoy the fruits of your labour. It is also a fantastic month for sowing seeds, as both soil and air temperatures are high. The long, warm days with good light levels speed up the germination process, helping you to extend your season of cropping in the vegetable patch and boost stocks of perennials, biennials and indoor exotics in the ornamental garden.

Bear in mind, however, that the water table is lower at this time of year and so extra watering may be needed. Water is always a valuable resource and used wisely can add to life's enjoyment without impacting greatly on the environment. Mulch where you can to reduce weed growth, water evaporation and reduce your workload! Move your mower height just one or two clicks just to help the roots retain more moisture and lawns will look better.



In the UK, plenty of flower and vegetable seeds can be sown in July, including biennials such as foxgloves, which should flower the following spring. Quick-growing crops like radish, French beans and carrots can be sown now. I experimented with pelleted carrot seeds this year with 100% germination rate and far easier to space them out – yet to eat them but looking forward to some lovely carrots. Fragrance is essential in a summer garden and there are plenty of richly scented plants that flower in July. If you have the room it's well worth creating a dedicated area of your garden to scented plants.

Or, if you're short on space, grow as many as you can in pots and containers. Star Jasmine is a particular favourite,. If you have space Buddleia has a special fragrance of honey and is a great winner for bees, Daphnes have pretty clusters of heavily scented blooms and the golden-leaved abelia produces scented, trumpetshaped flowers from midsummer and into autumn.

The Frenchay Flower Show has to have more than just a mention at this time of year -9^{th} July 2022.

Update from Frenchay Primary School

The new school building is taking shape with most of the triple glazed windows now in place. These take 2 to 3 days to fit for each classroom due to their size and weight! The wooden panels are being fitted to the top half of the building now, ready for more insulation next week. This helps to fully insulate the building like a thermos flask for our Passivhaus status. These will then be rendered.

Alongside the building project I have also been working with Pentagon Play who create play equipment and do floor markings on playgrounds. We have received our proposals for the play equipment which will be installed once we take possession of the building later this year. It will mean a short delay between moving in and having it fitted but I know it will be worth the wait. All proceeds raised for the FOFS (Friends of Frenchay School) will go towards new play equipment for the site, along with any other donations we receive.

Along with this I have been busy working with the interior designers, choosing the colours for each room along with the furniture and carpets/ flooring. As you can imagine, this is a mammoth task for a two form entry school. Lots of fun too though! The theme for the colour scheme is in line with our new logo, with an aim to be natural in colours and the feel. This reflects our beautiful surroundings with the conservation area on our doorstep. The view from the classrooms, overlooking the conservation area, is really quite tranquil and calming. We can't wait to get in!

The move is now planned for the 14th - 16th September so we will need to close for a short period of time to unpack and get set up. We will become a single form entry school in September so have additional places for some new pupils. We are looking froward to increasing our school community and welcoming new children to our warm and friendly family. Minister's Letter July 2022

How much things have changed in just one year! Even in a single day: as I write this the sun is shining brightly but the forecast for tomorrow is thunder and strong winds. However much we are aware of and are formed by mankind's history over the past hundred, thousand or even two thousand years, most of us have memories measured in decades and wishes in even shorter time spans.



This time last year, Covid was a key concern. Queues at

airports were almost non-existent; prices and interest rates had been fairly stable for a long time; there was no war in Ukraine; refugees arriving in England were not being threatened with deportation to Rwanda.

What can – or should - we do? Most faiths encourage their members to be kind to one another and to support those less fortunate than themselves. Christians are taught 'Love your neighbour as yourself'. Generosity, of our time as well as money, and care in the way we use the resources we have?

Jesus, in John Chapter 12, tells his followers that 'The poor will be with you always'. Unfortunately that is true. Welcome to July's Monthly Wellness Page – Skincare Ingredients Confused? Don't be!

Keeping it simple by washing your face with a basic flannel or enjoying a lengthy step by step routine is all allowed here but if you are struggling to make sense of the various new buzz words thrown at us by the beauty industry here is your crib sheet. Most importantly, taking care of your skin is NOT about being vain or the domain of just women. Young, old, male, female, dark, light – skin is skin and maintaining the largest organ in our body can make us LOOK and FEEL good.

I wrote back in March about SPF, so I will say no more here and move on to my top four ingredients:

Niacinamide

A hero ingredient because it is quicker to tell you what it doesn't do! It treats enlarged pores, uneven skin tone, fine lines, and boosts radiance. It is great after a bout of acne as it helps reduce the appearance of acne scars. Look out for a high concentrate 20% if you really want to tackle enlarged pores and sun damage but a 10% concentration is adequate.

Vitamin C - L-ascorbic Acid or Tetrahexyldecyl Ascorbate (THD)

Vitamin C is a powerful antioxidant already famous for its nutritional benefits but applied topically it is pretty special too. There are more than twenty forms of Vit C, the most widely used is L-ascorbic Acid but THD is by far the most stable and effective so look out for that in your products.

THD penetrates the skin deeper as it is oil-soluble, has a longer shelf life as it is more stable and is far less likely to cause irritation, even in sensitive skin. Affectively, it produces a brighter more radiant complexion from first use and over time it encourages collagen production and protects from sun damage.

Vitamin A - Retinol

This wonder vitamin tells our skin cells to hurry up and turn over just like they did when we were younger. Any age can start using it as it was originally prescribed for severe acne but recently it has become better known for keeping the skin looking young and the lines at bay. However, if you are pregnant (or could be) it is advised NOT to use. Like Vit C it stimulates collagen and over time produces a smother skin. It is especially important to introduce it gradually e.g., using it twice a week for at least two weeks before you move on to using it every other night. It must only be used AT NIGHT and as it makes you more photosensitive you MUST use an SPF the next day. Rules aside, it is proven to work so if you are patient get started!

Squalane

You might have noticed this mentioned in moisturisers etc. as it is an emollient, hydrating ingredient. Do not confuse it with the Squalene form which was traditionally derived form shark liver oil. Many brands use Squalane, a plant derived and sustainable version. As an ingredient it is a people pleaser so it likes hanging out with all the above ingredients e.g., you could pop a few drops of pure Squalane Oil into your current moisturiser as a comforting layer after Retinol.

Skincare has improved so much in recent years so don't be bamboozled and try a few of my suggestions.

Heat the oven to 200C/390F/gas 6. Brush a 30cm x 25cm baking tin with olive oil, then line with half the filo, brushing each sheet with oil as you go (a spray is useful here, if you have one), and taking care not to press them down in the process. Leave any excess overhanging the sides.
