

#### The Queen's Platinum Jubilee Celebrations 4th June Picnic Afternoon



Although FRA have promoted this as extensively as possible, you should have this June magazine in time for the full details.

On **Saturday 4<sup>th</sup> June**, on the common opposite Frenchay Parish Church from lunchtime onwards, FRA are organising a picnic afternoon to which you are all invited. We will have live music from the Concord Band and Church Choir to sing along to, followed by a young jazz band called 'The Provision' whose guitarist is a young lad from Frenchay Park.

The live music will start from 2.30pm with about 20 minutes of hymns introduced by the Reverend Charles Sugden, followed by 40 minutes of patriotic and popular songs to mark the Queen's reign and hopefully introduce a feel good afternoon with ample singing opportunities.

Following that the youngsters of The Provision will be entertaining us with their impromptu jazz act, something we are really looking forward to.

The words to the hymns and songs in the first hour will be put on the FRA Facebook page so that you can use mobile devices to sing along with us. Some printed copies will also be available.

We are planning to provide teas, coffee and cold drinks, but please bring everything that you need for the afternoon.

The famous FRA portaloos will reappear by the Church car park and every attempt will be made to get the psychedelic green ones used for our picnic day last August!

There will be plenty of room for games and other activities on the common, please do not bring BBQ's unless you are using the safe designated area by the school. We cannot risk injuries or fire damage to people and the common. Thank you for your consideration.

Finally we will do a 'bucket collection' to help fund the expenses of the two bands and their ongoing work, but the intention is to support these groups only, not any other causes.

We have publicise this on our Facebook page and all around the village, please feel free to share this information and encourage friends and neighbours to join us. We look forward to seeing everyone on the afternoon and we promise that good weather has been reserved!

#### Village Wild Flower Projects & Nature Reserve Pond

As we continue to work on the flora and fauna projects around Frenchay, the start of work on the new school playing field and landscaping will herald the pledge by BAM to clay line and prepare the nature reserve pond for planting.

As soon as we have firm dates for action we will request volunteers to help us which should be very enjoyable as we have our 'puddle clay' party. Get your wellies ready!

#### **Tucketts Field Proposal**

A proposal has been received for regenerating the wild flower meadow, similar to that planned by the National Trust in the adjacent field.

The initiative being put before Winterbourne Parish Council aims to replant the field with local wildflowers, add some replacement native trees and improve the area around Tucketts pond. The plan also aims to implement a conservation grazing regime.

Full details will be provided on our FRA Facebook page and circulated to our email database. A Q& A survey will be circulated in June, but please do let us have any initial thoughts to help with the presentation.

#### Becks Pool

We unfortunately have a similar problem to last year with rats making themselves very at home around the pond. Consequently we ask that feeding the ducks is stopped until we can resolve the problem please - we will provide an update and put notices at the pond.

Work to establish an information stone plinth, and power for a pond aeration system, is still progressing. We hope to have positive news on implementing these very soon.

#### **Frenchay Speedwatch**

Lighter evenings mean that these speed monitoring activities will start again shortly, the usual 'hotspots' continue to surprise us with some of the vehicle speeds being witnessed.

Our FRA led group is trained and ready to go, if you wish to be trained to help us please make contact. It has taken a lot of work to get this underway and get the police to train us.

#### Frenchay Museum

Volunteers from the Museum will be setting-up a stall on The Common near the Church for the Picnic Afternoon on Saturday 4th June. A range of books and publications will be available, together with various activities - for children & adults - so please stop by and enjoy. The actual Museum will be closed over the Jubilee weekend but anyone who would like to contribute a memory of Frenchay in the 1950s (and/or the Coronation!) is encouraged to do so - either on the day or subsequently by handing-in before the end of June. There are plans for an exhibition over the summer which will show-case Coronation memorabilia and a record of those personal, and no doubt, very interesting memories!

Q Community Hospital facilities on the old hospital site were pledged almost a decade ago now and we know that land is set aside for this project. So are SGC any further forward in fulfilling this pledge and responding to our local healthcare needs from our resident's surveys?

A We think that a final plan is at last being considered, but there has been no concrete news of how this will be provided nor any public consultation on the possible outcome yet.

Despite the dreadful impact of Covid on local government resources we think that this is very poor, given the time that has elapsed since the pledges were made. Such facilities would have a beneficial outcome for Southmead Hospital, where bed blocking is apparently a major problem.

#### Councillor Ben Burton reports: Beckspool Road, Traffic Calming

As many residents will be aware, the developers of the former Frenchay Hospital site installed traffic calming features on Beckspool Road, and safety and effectiveness concerns of these build outs were raised by residents and motorists. A public consultation took place for 3 weeks between 4th January 2021 and 25th January 2021, where many respondents were in favour of replacement measures, including lengths of proposed waiting restrictions, traffic calming and installing provisions to protect the eroding common.

The installation of speed tables will help to support the current 20mph zone and pennant kerbing will be added to prevent further erosion of the common. The installation of bollards around crossing points will help improve visibility for both pedestrians and motorists. We are committed to ensuring that drivers proceed cautiously through the village, especially given that the common is so well used locally and also forms a key route to the existing and new primary schools

We are pleased to report that the replacement measures for traffic calming have moved a step closer. The legal orders have been issued are being advertised in advance of the works taking place. We will keep residents updated as this progresses and hopefully there will be a swift completion of these much needed works

#### **Bristol Road - Zebra Crossing**

The highways team at South Gloucestershire Council have also investigated concerns of local residents in relation to the safety of the zebra crossing on the Bristol Road. As most of you will know, the pedestrian crossing facility is situated near two bus stops north of the junction with Filton Road. It is also near the new development on the old hospital site including the new Frenchay Primary School. We reported concerns that have been raised by local residents regarding safety while crossing at the zebra due to the speed of passing vehicles and some instances of motorists not stopping when pedestrians wish to cross.

The investigation reviewed the crossing itself, the speed of vehicles and historic accident figures at the location. The investigation concluded that overhanging vegetation should be cut back to improve the visibility of the crossing as this was partially obscuring the belisha beacons on the east side of the crossing. The investigating officer has also issued a drawing to the road maintenance team to refresh the existing zebra crossing road markings

We hope that both measures will help reduce the speed of approaching vehicles and make the crossing safer to use for residents. However, please let us know if there are particular concerns that you are experiencing in this location.

Welcome to June's Monthly Wellness Page – Eating more not less!



For several reasons I did not really enjoy school but as an adult I find myself enthusiastic about lifelong learning and am always happy if it involves food and nutrition. Just by chance, I recently came across a Facebook event entitled **Get Shut of Sugar by Gill Smith Holistic Health**. Agreed, social media can be a drain on our mental health and can prevent us from spending quality time being present in our "actual" lives but on this occasion, it was an eye-opening revelation.

We are all aware that eating too much sugar can damage our health, pile on the pounds, and increase our chance of developing Type 2 Diabetes, right? Commonly we associate this with cakes, sweets, and chocolates. We may be aware of what has become known as *hidden sugars* like those found in ready meals, sauces, and takeaways. Confusingly, sugar is not always labelled "sugar" and can appear on food labels as glucose, fructose, and sucrose, to name but three. It is all a bit overwhelming and who wants to walk round the shops reading impossibly small labels?

My philosophy? Instead of denying ourselves sweet foods, dieting, or watching the scales fill up on wholesome choices that serve you well. I highly recommend the use of a Slow Cooker if you find yourself too tired to cook after a long day. They can be quite inexpensive to pick up and use less energy than the average oven. Cooking with one of these could help you reduce the desire to buy expensive, sugar laden, ready meals so you can eat more while it is costing you less – win win.

Choosing **complex carbohydrates** like oats, brown rice, vegetables, and wholegrains in your cooking releases glucose slowly and steadily into your body and they are full of fibre! Eating **protein** at the same time slows this release down even further so for example a date with a dollop of peanut butter; a piece of fruit with a handful of nuts; a brown rice salad with tuna; even beans on toast – especially if you make your own beans (easy!).

Let us not forget **fat**, along with carbs and protein they are your essential **macronu-trients**. This bit of research blew my mind and has changed my life... Did you know the recommended daily sugar intake is 30g and that some low-fat yogurts have as much as 24g while a full fat yogurt can have just 8g?

The learning? Choose full fat Greek yogurt and enjoy it with your own selection of fruits or add it to your healthy home cooked casseroles – more is more!

# Our Minister, the Reverend Charles Sugden , writes



Dear All,

Usually I reserve a theme of 'waiting' to the Advent season, just before Christmas. Somehow, though, this seems an apt moment to renew this theme, at the mid-point in the year.

We have waited a long time, it seems, to celebrate something good as a nation. The most recent period of our Queen's reign has been beset with Brexit, Covid, Ukraine and Fuel problems. Each of them are ongoing, and we have our own local and personal crises, disappointments and delays. As though to scorn us, some things are so easy and instant, e.g. electronic communications and same day deliveries.

So, is there any merit whatever in being forced to wait? If the thing is a guaranteed promise, then surely, yes. The Queen's Platinum Jubilee is a fixed period of celebration. Wherever we are in the world, we hope to celebrate 70 years of her glorious reign. Here in Frenchay we look forward especially to events on the Common on Saturday 4<sup>th</sup> June.

In the bible, we are shown that waiting is part of repentance (turning to God in sorrow for our wrongdoing. But Jesus came to turn fear and mourning into joy and thanksgiving. For the person who puts their trust in him, he promises to stand in their place when their wrongs are laid bare on that day when Jesus comes again to judge the world.

So, this verse from 2 Peter chapter 3 sums up for me this time of waiting in which we live.

"The Lord is not slow in keeping his promise, as some understand slowness. Instead he is patient with you, not wanting anyone to perish, but everyone to come to repentance."

May we truly celebrate 'Jubilee' (the year of release) this June.

Then we had a street party with the children in fancy dress. I went as Queen Elizabeth 1<sup>st</sup> and my brother went as King Farouk (he was constantly in the news at that time).

He was a keen supporter of the Frenchay Tuckett Society, serving on the committee for many years. He also served as a custodian in the museum, and for a number of years he and Anne welcomed custodians to the Old Mill for their annual Summer Tea.

He was a solicitor, and his advice during the long drawn out process of trying to acquire the museum building from North Bristol NHS Trust was invaluable to the society.

Due to health problems, he and Anne moved to a bungalow in Blackwell two years ago, and he died at home on 6th April.

#### Gardening in 'Flaming June' - by Alan Caswell


June is the month where sunshine is at its most. It may not be the hottest month but this is when plants are given their most productive time to grow and thrive. New plants in the vegetable garden and bedding or container plants actually to do most of their growing now whilst light levels are high and temperature constraints lowest.

Once larger plants have established there should be ample water from winter in the soil to see them through in late summer. Newly planted seedlings and plants, however, need careful watering to ensure they thrive. We know all too well how fickle the weather can be and after a very dry April and not much rainfall in May your garden/allotment will probably need all the watering help it can get. Watering is key to growing plants well, this not only means providing the water our gardens need, but using it wisely. Water is a precious resource and supplies in the UK are under pressure. Fertiliser and mulching will help them make the most of this light for better results later in the summer.

Weeds, unfortunately, seem to lack the need for either water or nutrients to survive! Weed, weed and weed some more especially in wetter weather and lookout for slugs! They can decimate an unprotected crop but it is quite right that the slug pellet as we knew them are now banned! Once more we see the no mow areas have been in action again this year and is a mind change to help and protect our wildlife. We all love a nicely cut lawn but leave it a bit longer and if possible, create a no mow area yourself.

Visit your local garden centre to get ideas for great looking summer borders and hanging baskets. It's also time to prune your spring flowering shrubs such as forsythia. It makes for a healthier more robust plant next year. There should be some crops available if you have had the time to plant them but if not it's not too late to get some in. Cut and come again salad leaves are an easy grow and quite delicious. Look after your tomatoes and feed if necessary. Potatoes like water and hopefully there has been enough for a decent early crop.

Which brings us nicely to the Frenchay Flower Show. It doesn't matter what you think of your crops: it's all about entering and making the best of what you have. We all want this fabulous village event to be as bright and bountiful as it has in the past!

#### Recipe for June - Quick Calamari with Garlic Mayonnaise

I always have a bag of frozen squid in my freezer as a standby. This recipe makes a great snack with drinks, a starter for 4, or a quick supper for 2 with a salad.

Make the garlic mayonnaise by mixing  $\frac{1}{2}$  a clove of garlic and 100g best quality mayonnaise and adjust according to taste and make more if you feel it will not be enough. Mix thoroughly cover and put in the fridge.

Cut a lemon into wedges and remove any seeds.

250ml groundnut oil, or as needed depending on the size of pan

400 – 500g frozen squid (tubes and tentacles) defrosted / 2 tbsps cornflower / 4 tbsps semolina 2 tsp Old Bay seasoning or 1tsp salt and 1tsp paprika

- 1. Heat the oil in a smallish saucepan and while it's heating up drain and cut the thawed squid into 1cm rings.
- 2. Put the cornflower, semolina and seasoning in a good sized plastic freezer bag and shake up well.
- 3. Add the squid rings and tentacles to the bag and toss to coat.
- 4. Test the heat of the oil by dropping a cube of bread into it and it is hot enough if the bread sizzles up fiercely. Fry the squid in batches to get a golden crunchiness. Each batch will only take a couple of minutes. (The squid will go rubbery if it is cooked for too long)

Serve promptly with the garlic mayonnaise served in a small bowl garnished with a sprinkle of paprika and lemon wedges.

This is one of my favourite indulgences with plenty of garlic!!
