#### Frenchay Residents Association (FRA) Report No. 96

#### **Dear Friends and Neighbours,**

We understand from Winterbourne Parish Council (WPC) that all the final agreements are now in place for the Voluntary Village Green and Nature Reserve to be handed over to the Parish. The end of a very long and winding road, going right back to the previous RUG campaign nearly 10 years ago, when FRA made sure that the 20 acres of green space came to the village in perpetuity. When completion takes place I think everyone involved will be seen dancing around the new space whatever the weather, such will be the relief at delivering this legacy for everyone who fought so hard for so long to preserve this wonderful space.

It is also incredible to see the change in mind-set from 2013 due to so much concern about the Climate Emergency and environmental priorities changing so dramatically.

So those whom we fought for the space to save it from development are now offering assistance and massive donations of trees and plants to enhance the biodiversity. By the time you read this we expect to be planning the planting of over 500 tree whips and plants donated by the NHS and Woodland Trust. It really feels as if we are succeeding in making this space one to be proud of now that we can plan ahead for future generations.

WPC has now also launched its Local Nature Action Plan (LNAP) which will prioritise projects such as enhancing the biodiversity in Tuckett Field, where a specific WECA Bee-Bold Pollinator grant has been applied for by WPC who own and maintain this land.

Much more to follow on this, all local interest groups will have the opportunity to support this project leading up to the Centenary of its gifting to Frenchay Residents by the Tuckett family which falls in 2028.

#### **FRA Meeting/AGM**

We are conscious that with Covid problems still evident, getting everyone crammed into the Village Hall to sit down together might still not be considered ideal. Consequently, we are looking for a venue with more space and height. We also feel that after nearly three years an 'open evening' for FRA and other Frenchay interest groups like the Preservation Society and Tuckett Society for example, would be better to give residents the chance to catch up with what we are all doing collectively for Frenchay. This is particularly important for new Frenchay Park residents and residents new to Frenchay.

We have been offered the new school hall for such an evening and are working currently on a suitable date as the new school settles in. We are hoping that this can take place before the end of November and will confirm the details as soon as possible.

#### **Christmas Carols on the Common**

We have set a date for Monday 19<sup>th</sup> December starting at 6.30pm, same format as last year with us all gathering on the common opposite the Parish Church. This year we feel it is safe to try and offer some refreshments and festive offerings to keep everyone warm and happy, so if you are involved with or know of local voluntary groups that would like to provide refreshments at reasonable cost please contact us. We are thinking of hot drinks, soup, cake and mince pies for example. These can help local groups to raise funds for their own activities and we would very much like to support our local community in this way.

#### **Nature Reserve Pond**

At the moment we are waiting for BAM to add more clay to the upper slopes and help provide the structures around the pond so it is safe and available to be used by the new school. Understandably, BAM have been distracted as they race to get the new school open, but we have their pledge to see this project to completion.

A shout out for more help on the ground with this project from residents and DofE students will be coming out very soon, it has been so enjoyable getting hands dirty together.

#### **Becks Pool**

Work to tidy up before the winter was undertaken by our dedicated team of volunteers on Sunday 23 October, we are now planning the power supply and aeration system as described in October's FCN update.

The really good news, after some tenacious persuasion, is that Wessex Water have confirmed their Watermark Grant of £500 to the project, a presentation will happen soon.

Unfortunately the turmoil of Covid has led to delays in pulling this all together, but great deeds are wrought not by strength, but by perseverance!

#### **New Path to School**

Considerable pressure has been put on our SGC councillors to get this underway ASAP, some planning notes on the SGC portal suggest Redrow plan to complete this by Easter. As the new school is open this is simply not good enough now that the wall work is complete.

#### **Outstanding Matters**

There are a number of issues on which it is very important that SGC makes, and implements, certain decisions. Above all, the development of some form of health and social care facility on the dedicated 6 acres of land next to BIRU. Other matters include use of the vacated former primary school site, hopefully, to include a much needed nursery, and other local amenities, removal of the Beckspool Road build outs and the Hambrook traffic light system.

We very much hope that SGC will find time to deal with these matters in the near future, thus demonstrating that these issues really matter to them for Frenchay residents?

#### Frenchay Hill

Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> October saw the successful introduction of 400 'plug plants' into the Frenchay Hill embankment, this is an existing 'wild no mow' area and the plants are specifically chosen for that steep shallow soil bank to compliment DofE student work done in summer 2021. This work extended to some of the area by the new village hall wall and disabled access gate, where crocus bulb planting and grass/wild flower mix seeding has now taken place. For the bulb planting this is being done as part of a weekly community service bronze project by one of our DofE students with their parents. Many thanks to all of the wonderful volunteers who have got their hands dirty with us on these projects.

As part of all of this community activity, FRA are setting up a specific parent contact group for DofE students as we now have a growing group of students where projects can provide community service opportunities. 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
#### WINTERBOURNE PARISH COUNCIL

Tuckett Pond - We have been doing some investigations into the low level of the water (appreciate we have had little rain!) which has possibly been due to tree roots in the wall and the fall of a tree damaging the wall as well. It needs to be professionally surveyed and when we last had work done to desilt the pond the contractors found it difficult with access. We will endeavour to find someone who can do the job.

Frenchay Parklands - We have had another productive meeting with North Bristol Healthcare Trust and are trying to finalise the handover of the land. It is with both solicitors at the moment and we are hoping this will be progressed as soon as possible.

Beckspool Road - The unpopular 'build outs' installed a couple of years ago along the stretch opposite the church on the common we were promised by South Glos Council would be removed and traffic calming put in place. This has taken longer than expected and required further planning consultations. The new route through the wall by Cedar Hall needs the pavement dropping to provide a safer route on the road and this also is a route through to the new school.

#### Roadworks near the Museum

Please watch-out for the start of planned upgrades to the existing access road from the mini-roundabout, being carried out by Redrow & various contractors. We discovered some information during the planning application and have recently been updated by North Bristol Trust. It is understood that the road is being moved away from the Museum, leaving room for a pavement but with minimal loss of our garden areas. On balance, we hope it will be the start of some long-term improvements in the setting of West Lodge but no doubt also some short-term inconvenience!

#### **Councillor Ben Burton reports:**

#### Frenchay C of E Primary School

A huge congratulations to the staff and pupils of Frenchay C of E Primary School who have moved into their new buildings last week. Cabinet Members for Schools and Property Services, Erica Williams and myself, were given a tour of the £10.5m Passivhaus-standard facilities.

We witnessed first-hand the transformational impact this new learning environment will have on our local



young people. We were delighted to see that hard hats were a thing of the past and the classrooms were alive with the sound of children hard at work. It was noticeable that coats were not required and the energy and heat saving benefits of the building's design were clearly evident. We were also delighted to see that our young people were promoting sustainability in other ways, such as the separation of their waste after lunch (which was being served from the brand new kitchens).

The site constraints had caused headaches at the design stage but the tranquil environment that has been created can only support learning. The outside areas provide separate spaces for play, 'refection' and sporting activities, which will positively impact on both the young people's educational attainment but also their general well-being. Cllr Liz Brennan continues to work with road safety colleagues at South Gloucestershire Council to promote sustainable and safe routes to school. We look forward to the school achieving the Modeshift Stars accreditation.

We are also working with Redrow in order to expedite the finalising of the 'hole in the wall' route to school.

#### **Camping on Frenchay Common**

We have been made aware that campervans have been using parts of Frenchay Common for overnight stays. Whilst we appreciate that people from further afield recognise the beauty of Frenchay Common, it is clearly not appropriate for these unofficial overnight stays to continue

We have been in contact with legal officers at South Gloucestershire Council to understand possible solutions to this issue. We have provided details of possible byelaws that can be passed by Winterbourne Parish Council to prevent further camping and to remove advertisements from websites that promote the location. We hope these actions will allow Winterbourne Parish Council to pass the appropriate byelaw to prevent further incidents. We are grateful to the Frenchay representatives on Winterbourne Parish Council for their support with this issue.

#### No Holidays at the Holiday Inn

Our local hotel continues in use as accommodation for asylum –seekers while their applications are being processed, and our local Councillor Ben Burton was asked to find out what information he could, and he has been able to provide the following:



Asylum seekers are people who are seeking protection in the UK due to a conflict or persecution in their own country of origin

People are treated as asylum seekers until they are given right to remain in the UK than they can become full members of our communities

Filton contingency hotel for asylum seekers was established in November 2021 and currently supports up to 260 residents who are wating for outcomes of their asylum applications.

There is currently a 5-10% turn over each month.

The asylum provision in the hotel is managed by a company Clearsprings Ready Homes on behalf of the Home Office, with onsite management subcontracted to SBHL.

The package of support to the hotel residents is currently delivered by a local multiagency partnership including adult care, children's services, safeguarding, the ICB, community health, public health, adult education, community cohesion, the Police and a number of VCSEs.

The partnership is currently meeting fortnightly and driving a holistic service improvement plan for the hotel residents.

Since it's been set up it has been able to achieve a significant progress in a number of areas including the following:

Opening up some communal spaces in the hotel for residents.

Offer of numerous constructive activities in the hotel, e.g., football, cricket and sports sessions etc.

Offer of library cards and access to local leisure facilities for residents.

Offer of bikes for residents, which is particularly significant given the isolated location of the hotel.

Support from a number of VCSEs with asylum issues, some learning courses, metal health and access to basic necessities.

Regular drop-in sessions by the local police and South Glos Asylum and Refugee Services

Improvement in access to health services through commissioning a specialist service Haven which provides regular GP and nursing appointments in the hotel.

Covid 19 vaccination events, with offers of free haircuts and clothing to residents to support uptake.

Access to ESOL courses funded by the local government and delivered on UWE premises.

Effective safeguarding escalation process, and services for comprehensive services for Unaccompanied Asylum-Seeking Children.

Improvement in communication with Clearsprings Ready Homes and SBHL responsible for operational management of the hotel.

We are also currently developing further plans which would see us delivering more proactive and structured educational and skills training supports to the residents.

If members of the public are interested in supporting Asylum Seekers in our area the best way to do so would be through contacting one of the local voluntary organisations which currently provide support to the residents of the Filton Hotel, including Bristol Rights, Bristol Minds or Borderlands.

Information about how to get in touch with these organisations is available on line.

Other sources of information supplementing Ben Burton's report above include Bristol Refugee Rights, who provide general support to asylum –seekers in the city. However one problem for those in our local facility is that they usually do not have the financial resources to use public transport to get into the city to access charity support services. So, many of them take the long walk into Bristol, glad to be out of the restrictive feel of the hostel where they have otherwise little to do and little opportunity to mix with others. The leisure facilities of the Hotel are closed, and most of their time has to be spent in their bedroom. In other locations, local people have sought to help by arranging transport, and if anyone in this area is wanting to explore that, they could perhaps do so through one of the support charities.

Asylum-seekers are entitled to a very small supplementary living allowance while their claims are being processed, but often there may be a delay before that starts to come through. They may alternatively be issued with what are known as 'Aspen Cards'. This is a debit payment card given to UK asylum seekers by the Home Office, and which provides basic subsistence support, and purchases on the card are closely monitored by the Home Office.

So how long will this present situation last? No one can give a clear answer, and matters are continually kept under review. Contracts with SBHL and Clearsprings come up for periodic review. Asylum seekers have continued to arrive in the country in large numbers, and while that may reduce for a while over the Winter period, the issues will not go away any time soon.



#### This Month's Minister's letter

Do you think of November as the end of autumn or as the start of winter? Perhaps your answer depends on what weather you enjoy, or on memories formed in childhood. Do you perhaps see this November as starting to draw to a close the happenings of 2022, or is it a time of new beginnings, perhaps even a time to 'get ready' for Christmas, make your cake, write some cards?



Unfortunately, when I look at the News or read the papers, I often feel that they are promoting a winter of discontent. Certainly there are problems to be faced - and hopefully resolved - both at home and abroad. Some of them are happening to other people, people who are facing crises of flood, famine or war, or the effects of climate change. Other problems affect many of us. At home we are experiencing rising food prices, higher mortgage costs, and rapidly increasing energy bills for heating some of the least well insulated housing in Europe.

A year ago I wrote that the people of Frenchay had been pulling together, supporting others during the difficult times of Covid. What can we do now? Ours is often perceived to be a well off area yet there are many who will be struggling in the months to come. Jesus led by example, showing compassion and asking people to share their wealth with others. Can we do the same (whatever our beliefs) and look out for those around us who need help, especially those who live alone? Even small kindnesses can make a big difference.

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


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#### **Just Run's Winter Motivation**

#### FRENCHY PRESERVATION SOCIETY (FPS): full year report - November 2022.

In my half-year report back in June, I mentioned that there were three topics on the radar which are of great interest to local residents. The current update is as follows:

Hand-over of the Village Green areas – to be known as 'Frenchay Parklands'; now agreed in principle between North Bristol Trust and Winterbourne Parish Council. A final date - and accompanying celebrations – will depend on the lawyers!

Opening of the new Primary School – this has now been achieved and last month's FCN contained details of a chance to look round the buildings from 3.45 on 9<sup>th</sup> November. It is obviously very frustrating that the new walking route to school via the 'hole in the wall' by Cedar Hall is still to be finished under a separate contract. (Questions have been asked...!)

Further health provision in Frenchay – no actual news, yet, but we have been told by sources at South Glos... to 'watch this space'...

So, two out of three isn't such a bad result and there is more information, as ever, in this month's report by Adrian Collins on behalf of Frenchay Residents Association (FRA). Adrian and I are very conscious of the statistics which indicate that 'Covid' and the pandemic are still very much around, leading to thoughts about alternative ways of arranging meetings during the winter season.

Meanwhile, the four 'Frenchay Members' on Winterbourne Parish Council, namely Paul Kembery, Charlie Watkins, Adrian Collins and myself have been as busy as ever dealing with various Planning Applications and the detailed work of Finance & General Purposes committee. Two national issues are also on our local radar. The 'declared' climate emergency has led to the Parish Council pressing South Glos (as the planning authority) to encourage the highest possible take-up of environmental measures on new housing schemes and major conversions. The cost of living crisis has prompted F&GP to identify more opportunities for various grants & other financial incentives when setting budgets for annual costs associated with maintaining & improving our parish assets.

By the time this piece appears in print, we will be into the last 6 months of our current four-year term (how time flies since May 2019) and feel that some form of 'get-together' in Frenchay could be more effective in promoting what we have been doing on your behalf.

Further information will be made available via the FRA data-base in due course.

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#### **Report from The Dings:**

What a start to the season! As I reported last month we started the league season with two victories, including the much cherished defeat of Clifton. Following that we moved across the city to play our old friends and adversaries Old Reds in the second local derby. very hard fought game delivered another win for Dings moving us to the top three. This ended Red's 2 year unbeaten record at Scotland Lane.



Next we welcomed Bournville, from Birmingham, to Shaftesbury Park, another new opponent. This was a 14 try thriller, fully entertaining a large crowd with Dings coming out on top. 

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#### **Gardening in November**

Winter may be on the doorstep but there is still delight to be taken from the colours and depth in your garden and outdoor spaces. Trees are amazing things and as they sense a shift in daylight levels, they begin making changes to become more tolerant of cold temperatures. After the ravishes of the summer drought, what leaves are left, should be falling rapidly as the wind and rain increase but relish in the colours that they have and the thought of bursting back to life in spring. It may be a nuisance that you have to rake your lawns but leaf fall not only protects the trees from the effects of wind but also provides an excellent leaf mould. Its formed from decaying leaves and produces an invaluable soil conditioner.

As the weather gets colder pots need feet to keep them out of standing water and to stop the compost freezing in the bottom of the pot. Fleece (or bubble wrap if they are in a less windy area) your tender plants or move them under cover to avoid them becoming sodden but please do look after them with a bit of water when needed. Overwatering is the most common cause of loss of container plants; watering should aim to keep the compost moist, never soggy and avoid alternating dryness and saturation.

Roses in November are usually dormant. There is nothing to do now but reduce the size to help them survive root rock. Winter is regarded as the best season to prune most types of roses but rambling roses should already have been pruned after last flowering. Do not worry about them being exposed to extreme frosty conditions or snow as they are in hibernation and will be unaffected by the weather. If you have outdoor planters standing empty during the winter months, try some evergreen shrubs such as potted topiary using box. Or fill them with winter bedding plants such as ornamental cabbages and winter flowering pansies. Lawns will still need care and attention. Rake when necessary, avoid scarifying and foot traffic but don't be afraid to use the lawn mower on milder days.

Berries on bushes and trees will be a feast for birds; blackbirds and thrushes will become more noticeable searching your lawn for worms. Food and water may start to become in short supply for birds but they will repay you with keeping pests down. Leave food out for birds every day, including supplementary food such as suet and sunflower hearts, and fallen fruit. It's also a good idea to leave seeds on herbaceous plants and shrubs, and don't forget to keep your bird bath topped up and fight off the squirrels!

November can be thought of as the start of the gardening year where traditionally trees and shrubs are planted ready for next year's growth. Treat yourself to something new for your garden.

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
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Recipe of the Month - Cream of Roasted Mushroom Soup

This is the most deliciously warming soup for a cold day and serves 6 to 8.

750g mushrooms roughly chopped, ideally darker varieties such as chestnut or Portobello

1 onion, roughly chopped 2 celery sticks, sliced

1 medium carrot, scrubbed or peeled and finely chopped

3 garlic cloves, thickly sliced 75g plain cashews nuts

2 bay leaves 2 sprigs of thyme

2 tbsp olive oil 100ml dry white wine

800ml hot vegetable stock

Heat oven to 190C or 170C fan. Divide the mushrooms and all the other veg between 2 large roasting trays and then add the garlic, cashews, bay and thyme. Season with salt and pepper and trickle a tablespoon of oil over each tray, toss together and roast for 20mins.

Trickle the wine over the veg, stir, then return to the oven for 20mins, or until the mushrooms are soft and the carrots tender. Discard the bay leaves and thyme.

Scrape half of the veg mixture into a blender. Add half the hot stock and blitz to a smooth soup. Pour into a saucepan and then do the other half. Taste and add more salt and pepper if needed and a splash of hot water if it is too thick. Reheat the soup gently without boiling.

Serve in warmed bowls garnished with freshly chopped parsley, croutons or roasted nuts. And for those who are not vegetarian with a dollop of cream.
